Who is NCFE?

What is technical education?

Government-funded training and assessment for work (often for a specific job or occupation). It provides an alternative route to academic education such as A Levels, and includes classroom, work and online-based training including apprenticeships.

Technical qualifications are taught mainly away from the workplace (e.g. in classrooms or online) but may require some work experience.

NCFE's technical education portfolio supports young people aged 14-19, as well as adults. We aim to support learners to progress through a range of subject specialisms, equipping them with industryrelevant skills on their journey towards a brilliant career.

What's more, all our technical and vocational qualifications come with wraparound support and resources to support learners to success every step of the way.

For the current cycles of this reform, both levels are generally split into the following learner categories:

- o 16-19 and adult
- o Adult only

Reform

- From 2025-2026, Level 2 and 3 qualifications must meet new criteria and all others will have funding approval withdrawn.
- With the intention of streamlining the choice of qualifications at Level 3 and below, the Institute for Apprenticeships and Technical Education (IfATE) has launched a new employer-led process for approving technical qualifications.
- In the majority of cases, the only qualifications which will receive approval are those which align with or build upon the <u>Occupational Standards</u> set out by IfATE. They must also be demonstrably useful to employers and meet employers' needs.
- All new and existing Level 2 and 3 qualifications will need to be redeveloped and approved for funding by Department for Education (DfE), IfATE and Ofqual, or they will no longer attract public funding.
- The first approved technical qualifications will be available to be taught from 2025, following the first approval submissions window this July.
